 are from by searching online for 'indigenous Australia map'. After locating the
 Bibbulmun area, find your suburb to learn which language group are the
 traditional land owners of your area.
- Do you see examples of racism in your school or community? In groups, make
 a list of the examples you have seen, then try to come up with strategies for
 how these incidents could be stopped in future.



Research Fiona Stanley to write a fact sheet about her. Include which year she
was Australian of the Year and why she was chosen.



- In pairs, discuss whether you agree with Ms Bennell that young people can create a world where everyone is loved and accepted? What do you think the roadblocks to achieving this are, and how could you overcome them?
- If your school library has a copy of the Our Place book series, choose a book to read as a group, then discuss the themes mentioned and what you liked or disliked about the story.



• Write a poem, song or rap about your experiences with, or thoughts and feelings about, racism in Australia.
