- Go online and find out how to play a game of knucklebones. What objects could you use to play the game today?
- The ancient Greeks used pictures to tell stories which can appear as a 'frieze'. In pairs, make a list of the different ways modern stories can be told in pictures.
- There are some events in the modern Olympics which have their origins in the ancient Olympics. Make a list of the current events you think would have appeared in the ancient games.



- Zeus and Nike are famous Greek gods. Make a list of some of the other gods and what qualities are they known for.
- An amphora is a type of jug that could hold liquid like olive oil. Find out what other things an amphora was used for by the ancient Greeks.
- The British Museum is famous for its collection of Greek artefacts, including the Elgin Marbles. What are they and why are they important to the museum and the people of Greece?



- The Ancient Greeks: Athletes, Warriors and Heroes collection has come from the British Museum in London and is travelling across the Southern Hemisphere. What are some of the advantages and disadvantages of a travelling collection which is priceless?
- Why do you think people are interested in ancient cultures? What could be learnt from studying them?
- Are you interested in following the 2020 Olympic Games? Which sports are your favourite to watch?
